

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

Ops Chief Dawn Benton will be designing the Membership Database over the next




Starfleet Academy provides a number of courses which can be taken both for fun and to get credit toward a fictional rank promotion. The two most famous courses are OTS (Officer Training School) and its succeeding course, OCC (Officer Command College) which by their completion gives an automatic fictional rank promotion within the Station which deal with the structure of a Starfleet International Chapter and its day-to-day running. Other courses deal with department operation and Trekology in general. The full course list is available on the web at http://www.sfi-sfa.org and we will also have copies to give out at our April 3rd 4 pm meeting at the Morrow Media Play.

The First Starfleet Academy Party was called an OTS party which was held by the MacLeod Ship of the Station Valentine's weekend of 1998 and was held in the home of Fleet Captain Kathryn Webster. It was



aptain Kirk has hit it big in the booming stock market. An article on the front page of the business section of the *Atlanta Journal* for Friday morning, April 2, 1999 highlighted William Shatner's windfall as spokesman for the firm of Priceline.com. (See the article below.)

Actor's stake in firm blasts off

When William Shatner says on ads for Priceline.com Inc., "I told you it was going to be big — really big," he might have been talking about his bank account.

"Star Trek's" Captain Kirk was granted the equivalent of 125,000 shares for pitching Priceline.com. That stake was worth a



of 125,000 shares for pitching Priceline.com. That stake was worth a little more than \$10 million at Thursday's close, compared with \$2 million when the stock went public this week.

"If you look at the payday William Shatner is getting, and consider there are companies paying \$25 million to advertise for two years on [America

Shatner Online], it's very reasonable," said analyst Sara Zeilstra of Warburg Dillon Read.

A big jump in the stock of a company that has just gone public produces paper wealth for those who owned shares before the initial public offering. But companies and their underwriters often restrict how much stock those shareholders can sell, and when.

In the case of Priceline.com, its directors, executive officers, key employees and "substantially all" the current shareholders generally can't sell stock for six months without the OK of Morgan Stanley & Co.

Besides benefiting Shatner, the sale made billionaires out of Chief Executive Richard Braddock, 57, and founder and Vice Chairman Jay Walker, 43.

Care Groups: A Proposal

The Medical Department would like to propose forming Care Groups among all the Station Members. This would be simular to phone lists that have existed in the past on the Republic and MacLeod. A care group would consist of a care group leader and within the group some active members and some semi-active members and perhaps even some prospective members who express that they would like to be kept informed of station activities. The function of the care group would be to both act as a phone list to inform members of station activities but to also keep in contact with those members who have not attended meetings in a while. In that way we can show that we care about our members and give our members the chance to share both club and personal concerns. In the event that one of our club members are in need of help, we can take action in what ever way seems best. With 20+ members and associate members, the station would need about 3-5 groups to start with so that each list would consist of

no more than 6 names. By limiting the number of names, each care group leader would be able to have a relatively small group of members to call and thus have more time to devote to the concerns or needs of each member of the list. It seems logical that each groups would consist of a care group leader and members who all attend the same meeting and that family members living at the same address would be grouped together as one entry on the list. This would involve the care group leader calling the members of their group at least once a month ordinarily. The XO of their ship or CO of the station could request the care group leader to call the Members of the care group in case of a change in plans or an unannounced meeting or social. Care Group leaders would be expected to keep confidential all information shared with them that is not authorized by the member to be released to station as a whole and only share information of a member's need with the XO of the ship who will submit to the station a proposal (keeping the member's identity secret if requested by that member) to help. The actual function and procedures would of course be decided on by the

However, the Medical Department feels that keeping confidential things that should be kept confidential will aid the care group in it's purpose which would be to show each member that the station cares about them and that the station is willing to help each member in what ever way is possible.



One of the greatest mottos of Starfleet International (and Star Trek in general) is "Let me help," and the


Medical Department feels that by starting Care Groups in the Station we can put that motto into practice.

Gene Roddenberry Honored by Eater Seals Foundation

Even years after his death, Star Trek creator Gene Roddenberry continues to be honored by charities and organizations from across the spectrum -- including a recent award from the Easter Seals Foundation to be telecast nationwide. Come March 27, fans should look for the gala special "Hollywood Salutes Easter Seals" in their local TV markets for a glimpse of the honor, the Easter Seals Hollywood Lifetime Achievement Award, and its presentation to GR's widow, Majel Barrett Roddenberry. On hand to present the award were three of Star Trek's best known: James Doohan ("Scotty," Star Trek), Jeri Ryan ("Seven of Nine," ST:VOY), and Avery Brooks ("Captain Sisko," ST:DS9.)

Colm Meaney Returns to New York Stage

Wasting no time after the wrap of filming his series, Colm Meaney ("O'Brien" on ST:DS9) opens the New York premiere of The Cider House Rules, Part I: Here in St. Cloud's at the Atlantic Theater Company on May 6. Previews begin April 17. Spanning decades and generations in rural Maine, the play looks into the world of Dr. Wilbur Larch, a kindly orphanage director and physician, and his beloved protegee, Homer Wells. Adapted by Peter Parnell from John Irving's best-selling novel, the play is conceived and directed by Tom Hulce and Jane Jones and ranges on topics from reproductive choice to family and parenthood. 
The Latest Star Trek: The Next Generation Video Episodes


Hot News of Latest Star Trek Merchandise Items



Also arriving on shelves this week are two 9" exclusive figures, "Seven of Nine" in her brown uniform and "Captain James Kirk" in the environmental suit as seen in the episode, "The Tholian Web". Even more exciting are the first wave of 1999 12", fully poseable deluxe action figures. The first items are "Captain Kathryn Janeway" from Star Trek: Voyager, "Lt. Geordi LaForge" as seen in Star Trek: Insurrection, "Mr. Spock" in original series uniform, his right hand posed in the Vulcan "Live Long and Prosper" salute from Star Trek, and "Andorian Ambassador Shras" from the Star Trek episode "Journey to Babel". Keeping An Eye on the Universe




The "Discover" column in the Atlanta Journal and Constitution for Sunday, February 21, 1999, carried a short feature titled "Celestial Crisscross." The article noted that the planet Pluto, with an extremely eccentric orbit that occasionally crosses the orbit of Neptune, has now reclaimed its position as the outermost planet of our solar system. Pluto had been inside Neptune's orbit for the last 20 years, since February 1979. For the next 228 years—until Pluto again "crisscrosses" Neptune's orbit—it will remain the farthest known planet from the sun.



An article in the "Sunday Reader" section of the

Atlanta Journal and Constitution for Sunday, February 21, 1999, was titled "Name That Probe." In the place of forbiddingly acronymic names, NASA is now inviting the public to provide names for its deep space exploratory vehicles. The article

states: "The trend started with the Sojourner rover, which trundled across the surface of Mars with a historical name chosen by a 12-year-old Connecticut girl; her suggested name evoked abolitionist Sojourner Truth, with the connotation of 'a search for truth." Alan Bunner, director of NASA's Structure and Evolution of the Universe program, hit upon the need to involve the public in NASA's missions. Contests to "name that probe" kindle enthusiasm and a sense of connection with investigating the vast reaches of space. "So Bunner thought that a contest to rename the clunky-sounding AXAF -- the Advanced X-Ray Astrophysics Facility – would be popular, and it was. 'The response was pretty amazing,' he said, generating more than 6,000 essays from around the world, including 500 from Tehran." The eventual name selected was the "Chandra X-Ray" probe, named after Indian astrophysicist Subrahmanyan Chandrasekhar. The probe will be launched July 9, 1999 from a space shuttle. The article notes that entries are now being accepted to name two basketball-sized Mars probes to be launched from the Mars Polar Lander. To submit a suggestion, write an essay of 100 words or less choosing the names of people from history, mythology, or fiction, or places or things appropriately associated with Mars. Send your entries to Deep Space 2 Naming Contest, Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Mail Stop 301-325, 4800 Oak Grove Drive, Pasadena, CA 91109-8099. 🗭


See No Evil

Like many people, I watched the recent TV miniseries "Storm of the Century" by Stephen King. I had some concerns about

the consistency of the show – Was this guy a genuine demon or some kind of sorcerer? The abduction scene with what looked like an evil magician in mystical robes with an enchanted staff rising into the night sky toward the moon cradling a child was gripping and horrifying, but everything else was a crashing bore. (I got so tired of him flashing his fangs every ten minutes.) At any rate, my point is that, as a bona fide ST fan, my perception of the universe doesn't really include this kind of supernatural evil. It makes dynamite television, certainly, and just like a carnival funhouse, we all love being chilled and frightened occasionally, but as the heirs of Gene Roddenberry's bright and humanistic vision of the future, do we Trekkers really believe in brooding, festering ancient evil? In all of ST, there are many, many references to the evil that comes from within men or which arises from the results of men's actions, but there are very few references to the kind of occult evil or supernatural horror for which writers like Stephen King or Dean Koontz are famous. The Classic episode "A Wolf in the Fold," which posits the existence of the immortal spirit of Jack the Ripper, is an obvious exception to this statement. Far more common are episodes which deal with the almost inhuman cruelty of which mere men are capable, even in the ST universe. Episodes like "Conscience of the King,"

which revolves around exposing the mass murderer Kodos, and the recent Voyager episode "Nothing Human" (discussed in this column in the November/December 1998 issue) in which the Doctor must deal with the heinous medical "research" of a Cardassian physician are far more typical of what constitutes "evil." It seems that in Roddenberry's concept of the universe, evil is merely the result of bad actions by bad men plagued by their own "inner demons"; evil as a supernatural concept does not exist. Therefore, men have the ability – and the responsibility – for correcting their own actions and undoing the evil they have caused. This is true redemption, not just the vanquishing of a terrifying demon from some nonexistent netherworld.





Cybernetics: Are We the Borg?

"A cyborg is a science fiction chimera from the 1950s and after; but a cyborg is also a powerful social and scientific reality in the same historical period. Like any important technology, a cyborg is simultaneously a myth and a tool, a representation and an instrument, a frozen moment and a motor of social and imaginative reality. The cyborg is the figure born of the interface of automaton and autonomy." (Donna Haraway. "A Cyborg Manifesto: Science, Technology, and Socialist-Feminism in the Late Twentieth Century," London: Free Associations, 1991)



This mouthful of prose aptly expresses the ambivalence many thinkers and scientists have toward computer-enhanced flesh-and-blood organisms. The philosophical and social dilemma is where to draw the line between a mechanism which still encapsulates an essential humanity—a "bionic" entity (to employ the phraseology of a sci-fi TV series popular some years ago, or a "robocop"), an entity which still utilizes a self-aware human consciousness to motivate itself, or the ultimate machine intelligence which uses flesh-and-blood components as no more than spare parts as extensions of itself.

From Homo Sapiens to Homo Cyberneticus:

The Future of Our Evolution (from an essay by Daniel Bernardi, professor of film, television, and cultural studies in the Department of Film and Television, UCLA)

Homo Sapiens Moves Closer to a Cybernetic Experience. As microprocessors become smaller and more powerful, and as the medical profession finds more ways to augment the human body with prosthetics, we Homo Sapiens move closer to a cybernetic existence. Indeed, humanity is about to become one with machine, ushering in a new phase in our evolution: post-human embodiment, or Homo Cyberneticus. "I think, therefore I am a cybernetic organism."

This is not just the stuff of science fiction. The idea for cybernetic organisms emerged in the 1960s when NASA scientists, Manfred Clynes and Nathan Kline, suggested that altering the human body with machines would be an advantage for space travel. It was Kline who coined the term "cyborg," an abbreviated form of "cybernetic organism." The idea and the term were later picked up by science fiction writers. [This happened again in the early 1980s when SF punk writer William Gibson used "cyberspace" for the first time; a concept was born and has been picked up by scientists and writers worldwide.]

A cyborg-reality is closer than you might think. Many of today's scientists, not to mention budding capitalists, are diligently working to "make the blind see and the lame walk." Some companies are developing retinal implants. Others are working on neural stimulators. And still others are working on hard-wired prosthetics. As Jeffrey H. Greiner, president of Advanced Bionics, told the Los Angeles Times: "In the next five years, we are going to move all across the body." For science and industry, the goal is to raise the quality of life for all those who are in need.

What Will a Cybernetic Future Look Like? But before we get carried away, let us not forget the lessons of Star Trek's Delta Quadrant. In this faraway space-time, one of the most menacing forces is the Borg. The Borg are comprised of numerous humanoid species who are as much living tissue as machine. Possessing a collective or hive-like consciousness, their only goal is to "assimilate" other humanoids into their mechanistic way of existence. To them, the cyborg way is the best way—and individuality is utterly foreign. According to Locutus of Borg, they also "wish to raise quality of life for all species."

Are we destined to the gloom and doom of the Borg's space-time? What will a cybernetic future look like? Will it be grotesque, with a lot of Frankensteins walking around like crazed beasts? Will it be more rigid and mechanical, where human bodies are more machine than biology? And who will control who gets the cybernetic implants and who doesn't? Will it be the government? Will it be the scientist and capitalists?
