Attention all hands. A new command crew has come on board the REPUBLIC, and the majority of the division chiefs have changed.


As first officer, it is my duty to assure the smooth operation of the ship. Please feel free to contact me for any new ideas, suggestions, or comments.

A NEW REPUBLIC

I felt compelled to do this article because it is of concern to all of the crew of the Republic. "It" is, of course, the upgrading of the Republic from an Enterprise class heavy cruiser to an Alaska class supercruiser. There are many who feel that this is a worthy endeaver for the chapter, but there are also those who feel that this is not the "right" thing to do. In truth, there is no right or wrong concerning this decision. There are, however, some good reasons to pursue the idea. I for one am a fan of the old "outdated" Constitution class starship. Nothing else can quite give me the same feeling or cause my chest to swell with pride, as the sight of the "old" Enterprise, or one of her sister ships as they majestically transverse the final frontier.

Even in death, the constitution class starships were proud and heroic: yet we knew that death did not spell the end to the legacy of those tall ships and what they stood for. No, all that they were, and could be, would live on in another ship with the same name to carry on the heritage, and add to the honor of that ship's name.

The Enterprise is an excellent example of this passing on of name and legacy. Through several reincarnations, the Enterprise has added to the legend and mystique of her proud heritage and so should it be with the Republic.

In her current incarnation, the Enterprise is a Galaxy class exploration ship, capable of journeying further than any starship before it, and safely returning to tell about it. Since the destruction of the Yamato, the task of deep space exploration has fallen back to the Enterprise, as well as the ships of the Alaska class, since they are the only ships with anything near the endurance and range of the Galaxy class ships.

Skip to Greenville, S.C., and MOC IV. While talking about the future of Starfleet in general, and the Republic in particular, it was conceded that most of us liked elements of both the movie Treks and the Next Generation Trek. Yet, we didn't want to be pinned down to one time frame or the other exclusively as far as our chapter and ship were concerned. Then, while walking throught the dealers room, we spied a poster with diagrams and

histories of all the ships named Enterprise, and there was the answer to our dilemma starring us right in the face. A ship class that was in a time frame between the movies and the Next Generation.

The Alaska class – she is much sleeker than the Excelsior class - yet she retains the lines of the starships that we have all come to love. She holds the promise of things to come, yet is achingly familiar to us. She is big, and yet one can sense the power and grace that she exudes as she proudly sails through uncharted space. Yes, we agreed, this is the future, bright with the promise of exploration and contact of new worlds and new civilizations. Bold enough to be able to do so safely, while at the same time guaranteeing the freedom of the home worlds and colonies of the Federation. For you see, all new frontiers are fraught with dangers, and perhaps enemies and potential explorers had better be prepared to defend themselves, or pay the price for being unprepared. Hence, the reason for the existence of the supercruiser. To put it all into perspective, one should realize that at the time of their inception, the Constitution class starships were the most heavily armed ships in the Federation.

So we come almost full circle in a quest for a way to represent our chapter as a constantly growing entity, full of promise. But any decision that affects our future should be debated, for this is a sign of a healthy and dynamic organization. Though let us be clear in the reasons for our proposals both pro AND con, for these decisions should serve to bring us together, not divide us.

My final reflection is that as a ship and a chapter, where we are going is at least as important as where we have been. Therefore, I feel that the upgrade to an Alaska class starship says that we are committed to the best of both Trek generations, and that we are more interested in seeing "What's out there", than sitting on our laurels, comfortable in our past accomplishments. This change would give us the freedom to grow, experience, and to participate in the birth of the Grand Alliance! The spirit of the proud ship Republic lives on...

THE GENETICS OF SPOCK

Fans have been speculating about the how's of Spock's conception and birth ever since it became known that he is, to use a word some novelists have used, a "fusion" of human-vulcan heritage. This article will attempt to extrapolate how a hybrid such as Spock might one day be possible using current breakthroughs in DNA technology as a starting point.

The word fusion is used in several Star Trek novels in referring to the hybrid offspring of two different species. This concept has been used to explain two things: The three very different looking types of Klingons we have seen, and Spock. The use of the word fusion in this case seems appropriate because it refers not only to the fusing of egg and sperm nuclei, but also the fusing of gametes of very diverse species.

In a recording that Gene Roddenberry and the original cast made called "Inside Trek", Mark Lenard as Sarek gave his opinion of Spock's conception. He stated that he and Amanda did indeed have sexual relations and concieved Spock normally. How could this be believed when right now we have women who have serious problems carrying a baby full term becuase the child's bloodtype is too different.

Considering that this happens within the same species, imagine what Amanda's problem of carrying a baby with blood so different as to be copper based and of a type known as T-negative.

In all probability Spock would have been the most planned of babies and Amanda probably would not have carried him inside of her body. One novel gives a good explanation of this: Sarek and Amanda had the best scientists anywhere to help them out, those at the Vulcan Academy of Science.

The first problem our genius Vulcan geneticists would have to overcome would be to complete a DNA map of the entire Vulcan and Human DNA. That is, the need to know the position of each nucleic acid in the DNA and correctly interpret what they code for. A big step in the sequencing of human DNA has recently been taken by the Japanese who have invented a DNA sequencing computer that works faster than any old model sequencer, perhaps one hundred times faster.

This leads to another problem: the universal-

ity of the DNA triplet codes. From 1960 to 1978 it was assumed that the genetic code would be universal, applying to all living things. But then studies of the DNA from yeasts and human mitochondria changed that. A codon is defined as 3 bases that encode for specific amino acids. In the human nucleus, the codon made up of the bases adenineuracil-adenine (AUA) specifies the production of the amino acid called isoleucine, but the mitochondria AUA causes the production od methionine. (Note that mitochondria are thought to have once been part of a microscopic animal that became incorporated into our cell through evolution.) If this is so how can we be sure that the Vulcan DNA codons mean the same thing as ours? For now, though, the mitochondrial and yeast DNA differences are considered only as interesting exceptions to the rules, and we will assume that Vulcan codons are like our own in all ways.

The next problem envolves what is called the complementation of chromosomes. Human beings have 46 chromosomes which nearly all exist as homologous pairs (two similar chromosomes). The gametes each contain 23. On each member of one homologous pair the gene locations are exactly the same, though the gene on one chromosome may code for blue eyes while its homologue may code for brown. If we want to fuse two gametes from different species, say human and vulcan, how can we be sure that even if their chromosome number is the same that the different genes will be able to divide properly because it has non-homologous chromosomes.

The vulcan geneticists at the academy would have to do a wonder of DNA splicing to make Spock. The DNA techniques we have now, though able to produce a mutant, cancer prone type of lab rat, is not nearly sophisticated enough to make a fusion. The easiest way might probably be to take each homologous pair of chromosomes together from either parent so that they wouldn't have to worry about whether or not they belong together. Since Spock seems to possess many vulcan traits we would guess that they took the preponderance of chromosome pairs from Sarek. By Spock's actions we see that he also has many human qualities which give testimony to Amanda's genes also. As Spock is such an exceptional individual, we can guess that if Vulcan geneticists possess the ability to activate

some genes and deactivate others, they would use only the best of each.

Our genetics technology has a long, long way to go to reach this point. Perhaps later in the next century we will be able to project a better way to create a being such as Spock. With the little we know now, though, even if Vulcans did exist, a mating between them and Humans will remain a favored fiction.


